Dear Friends and Supporters,

In 2014, slightly more than half of Americans ages 12 and up reported they consume alcohol. Most would be described as moderate drinkers. But for nearly one in 10, their substance use has evolved into a disorder, meaning that it is negatively impacting their health, their ability to tend to daily responsibilities and their personal relationships.

In 2017, Colorado reported more than 1,000 drug overdose deaths and 558 were related to opioids or heroin. That represents a 100 percent increase compared to 2016. Nationally, the cumulative cost of substance use disorder is estimated to be \$504 billion a year. More than one in four adults living with serious mental health conditions also has a substance use problem.

Old attitudes about addictions were largely based on the belief that addiction resulted from moral weakness and that recovery could be achieved simply by willpower and self-discipline. We now recognize substance use disorder as a chronic disease that changes both brain structure and function. A study published by Harvard Medical School captured it best, stating that, "Just as cardiovascular disease damages the heart and diabetes impairs the pancreas, addiction hijacks the brain."

Community Reach Center's 2018 Annual Report highlights our new comprehensive continuum of care for the treatment of substance use disorder that includes withdrawal management services in a social detox setting, intensive residential treatment, outpatient services, medication assisted treatment and psychoeducation aimed at providing people with the tools to manage their cravings while adopting healthy coping strategies. The Community Reach Center team is honored to guide tens of thousands of clients toward their individual paths to recovery and wellness each year.

Withdrawal Management Services



Community Reach Center provides the only monitored, safe and supportive withdrawal management service in a social detox setting in Adams County.

Individualized interventions and after-care supports provide health and wellness education, recovery strategies, coaching and referrals to appropriate treatment, based on individual need. Once discharged, many clients are referred to Community Reach Center's Margaret Carpenter Center for intensive residential treatment. More are referred to intensive outpatient programming, including individual and group therapy, case management, peer support, psychiatric care and a wide variety of other services to support recovery.

The facility operates 24/7/365 and employs a multi-disciplinary staff who specialize in substance use services to assist people in what is often the first step in their recovery process.

Intensive Residential Treatment for Substance Use Disorder



Community Reach Center opened the Margaret Carpenter Center in 2018 to meet the need for substance use disorder treatment in Adams County and the surrounding regions, when Arapahoe House closed its doors in late 2017. The newly remodeled 43,000-square-foot facility currently provides intensive residential treatment and medication assisted treatment.

Community Reach Center's Intensive Residential Treatment for Substance Use Disorder (IRT for SUD) is an effective level of care for men and women dually diagnosed with a mental health challenge and SUD who have been prescribed this higher level of care as the best treatment course to support recovery.

Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) for Substance Use Disorder



Medication Assisted Treatment (MAT) is for people 18 years of age and older diagnosed with an alcohol or opioid use disorder. MAT combines behavioral therapy and medications to treat substance use disorders. Medications commonly prescribed are Naltrexone (Vivitrol) and Buprenorphine (Suboxone). Basically, the medications normalize brain chemistry, block the euphoric effects of alcohol and opioids, relieve physiological cravings and normalize body functions.

A common misconception associated with MAT is that it substitutes one drug for another. Actually, these medications relieve withdrawal symptoms and psychological cravings and do not produce a "high." Research shows that when administered at the proper dose, MAT medications have no adverse effects on a person's mental capability, physical functioning or employability.

Treatment Plan


Client and therapist work together to identify treatment goals and develop a treatment plan that maps a path to achieving them. The treatment plan is reviewed regularly to ensure that clients are receiving all services indicated in the plan.

This treatment approach has been shown to:

- Increase client's engagement in treatment
- Decrease criminal activity among clients with substance use disorders
- Increase client's ability to gain and maintain employment
- Improve birth outcomes among pregnant women who have substance use disorders

Narcan Protocol



2018 marked the launch of the Naloxone (Narcan) protocol at Community Reach Center. Narcan is a medication used to rapidly reverse opioid overdose by binding to opioid receptors in the brain, essentially knocking the opioid from the receptor. It quickly restores normal respiration to a person whose breathing has slowed or stopped as a result of overdosing with heroin or opioid pain medications.

Deaths from overdose of opioids more than tripled in the U.S. from 2000 to 2014. According to the Tri-County Health Department, 343 overdose deaths were attributed to opioids, heroin and fentanyl in Adams County between 2013 and 2017. Although many oppose public access to Narcan based on concerns that it may enable abuse of heroin and other opioids, research has not validated those concerns. The medical community widely supports making Narcan more easily available, because it saves lives. Narcan can be purchased over the counter without a prescription and is fully covered by Medicaid programs in Colorado.

Community Reach Center's nursing team provides training on how to administer Narcan for all staff on Withdrawal Management Services, Medication Assisted Treatment and Intensive Residential Treatment teams and family members of clients served by those teams.






